# Sentimentality and Seduction: Love in the Eighteenth Century

For our 41st annual meeting, SEASECS will be heading south to the balmy breezes of north central Florida. With an average February temperature of 70, Gainesville offers those of us in chilly climes an opportunity enjoy warm weather and warm company. The University of Florida, Laura Miller, and Rori Bloom will be our hosts. Our theme this year, "Sentimentality and Seduction: Love in the Eighteenth Century," also promises warm (even heated) scholarly conversations. SEASECS plans to uphold its reputation for lively entertainments, witty colleagues, and fine scholarship. The conference will begin Thursday, February 26, 2015 and conclude Saturday the 28th.

The conference hotel is the Hilton-University of Florida Conference Center, bordering the university campus and across from the Harn Museum of Art, the Florida Museum of Natural History, and the Phillips Center for the Performing Arts.

# Knoxville Highlights: SEASECS 2014

## **Plenaries**

We were treated to two fascinating talks by luminaries in our field:



Heather McPherson, Professor of Art History at the University of Alabama, Birmingham, presented a lavishly illustrated address, "Siddons Redux: Twilight and Afterlife of a Star," which traced Sarah Siddons's later performances (as an older and heavier woman) of public readings, including male roles like Hamlet.

**Srinivas Aravamudan**, Professor of English and Dean of the Humanities at Duke Universities, closed the conference with "Oriental Despotism Reconsidered."

Aravamudan reflected on the imaginative geography of governmentality after colonialism, in which despotism is linked to

hot climates and monarchy presents as modernity's middle way, though always at risk of falling into despotism itself.

## Graduate Student Events

Shelby Johnson, the graduate representative on the SEASECS board, organized several excellent events, continuing the SEASECS

tradition of supporting graduate students. Grad students were treated to their own cocktail reception at the East TN Historical Society. A special mentoring session, featuring professors, addressed topics such as the job market and job placement, publishing, teaching, and working at different kinds of institutions. Brunch and coffee were provided, so the panel, perhaps in the best eighteenth century tradition, recalled the coffeehouses of London.

## THE PUNCH!

Thrill your friends, impress your colleagues, poison your enemies — here is the infamous 18th-c. punch recipe from SEASECS 2014!



Dissolve 2 cups of Demerara or Turbinado sugar in 1 cup water over a low flame (about 5 minutes). Let this cool. Squeeze 12 limes into a large bowl and add 12 oz of the Demerara sugar syrup and stir.

Add 2 750-ml bottles of Black Strap Rum (Cruzan, with 1760 on the bottle, is the magic. Don't compromise.) Add 2 quarts water, stir again and refrigerate. Half an hour before serving, ice it generously. Add a large block of ice (this can be made by freezing 2 quarts of water in

a bowl overnight) and some sliced lime to go traditional. Grate a wee bit of nutmeg over the top. Serves 20 polite persons, or 10 SEASECSers.
